CONFERENCE QUESTIONNAIRE

Of all the responses in the CFS Questionnaire we thought it would be helpful and interesting to bring together the suggestions for Symposium Topics and Conference services. The suggestions range from projects now being undertaken, e.g. federalism research inventory, grants-in-aid symposium, to those made up of our wildest dreams, e.g. computer search services for bibliographic retrieval on federalism and intergovernmental relations topics, on-going floating federalism symposium. These suggestions are only "of our wildest dreams" for now because of the money and staff that would be involved--it is something for the Conference to aim for.

There seems to be a communication difficulty between the NOTEBOOK and the membership, which is pointed up in the number of suggestions for services, submitted on the questionnaire, that we have tried to institute but have failed for lack of response.

The NOTEBOOK wants to serve as the vehicle for federalism information such as: notices of members' publications in the field, abstracts of published work, announcements and summaries of workshops, and symposiums on federalism, a clearinghouse of information and queries, and directory of those working in the area of federalism. The only response we have gotten from members has been course reading lists and syllabi. These have proved very helpful.

In the near future another questionnaire will be sent out to get at some of the suggested areas not covered previously. Members need not wait for the questionnaire--but should submit information to the NOTEBOOK at any time.

Thank you all for your suggestions. We hope you will be pleased with the grants-in-aid symposium, inventory of research, and Expense Grant Program. Full addresses for members can be found on pages 17-21.
